The second reason he liked the camp was because Olivia Weeks had told her story to the us. Her story had everyone astonished on how amazing it is to come from rock bottom, and rise to the top. I personally was very impacted by her story.

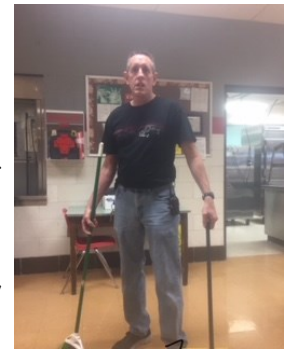

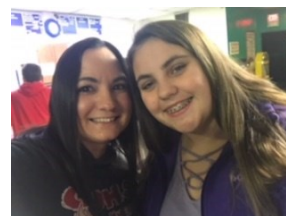
Through the years Mrs. Knox had some students she really liked. Bre, Makayla, Courtney, and George are a few that she has enjoyed teaching.

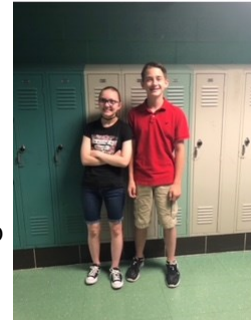
The thing Dominic loves the most about Maggie is her smile, and Maggie loves his eyes. They have

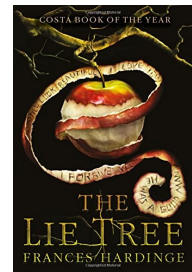
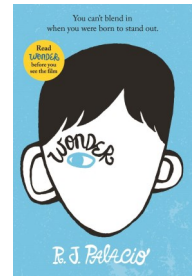
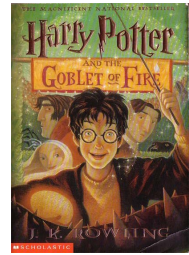
Wonder By: R.J. Palacio

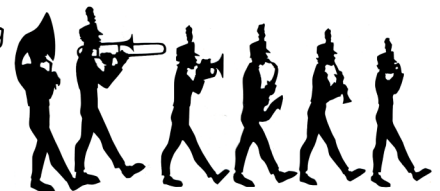


Band By Stacey Tindall
